An improved start to 2023 for all year groups with the top spot in contention between Y10 & Y7. Keep up the good work everyone!


Our Free food Friday year group next week will be Y9. All students in 100% for the week will receive free snacks on Friday break time.








# Book Recommendations

#### Year 7

Becoming Mohammed Ali, by James Patterson and Kwame Alexander

Have you every wondered how the greatest boxer who ever lived became such a legend? Patterson and Alexander use primary sources that have never been seen before to reconstruct Ali's childhood in Louisville. Told in poem form in Ali's voice, with notes by his best friend Lucky, Becoming Mohammed Ali moves between childhood memories and snapshots of his fights to build a picture of the man who would take the world by storm. Overcoming segregation and racism, hardship and bullying, Cassius never lost sight of his greatest ambition. Mohammed Ali comes alive in the poetry of Kwame Aalexander. Perfect for readers who don't have time to read a thick biography, this book is like having a conversatin with the young Ali.

#### Year 8

Five Survive, by Holly Jackson

Jackson is best known for her 'Good girl's guide to murder' series, but with Five Survive she makes a departure from her usual format. This is a thriller of the best sort. Six friends set off on a road trip in an RV, looking forward to spring break, but someone has a secret. A secret that might just get them, and their friends, killed. If you like edge of your seat, who's going to die next, mysteries this book is for you!





#### Year 9

Just Sayin': my life in words by Malorie Blackman

Malorie Blackman's autobiography pulls no punches, detailing as it does the racism and sexism that conspired to derail her life. Malorie is truly inspiring (although she makes it very clear that she doesn't want to be an inspiration!) as she talks about her childhood, being told by her careers teacher that people 'like her' don't become teachers, living with a debilitating disease, and finding her voice as the writer of the hugely successful Noughts and Crosses.

Fascinating and thought provoking, Just Sayin is eye opening, shocking and enthralling.

#### Only on the Weekends by Dean Atta

A must-read queer love story for fans of Sarah Crossan and Sex Education, written in verse by Dean Atta. Fifteen-year-old Mack is a hopeless romantic he blames the films he's grown up watching.

He has liked Karim for as long as he can remember, and is ecstatic when Karim becomes his boyfriend - it feels like love.

But when Mack's dad gets a job on a film in Scotland, Mack has to move, and soon he discovers how painful love can be.

It's horrible being so far away from Karim, but the worst part is that Karim doesn't make the effort to visit.

Love shouldn't be only on the weekends. Then, when Mack meets actor Finlay on a film set, he experiences something powerful, a feeling like love at first sight.

How long until he tells Karim - and when will his old life and new life collide?
