A message from Linda Rodham, CEO

Dear Parents and Carers,

We are now near the end of the spring term with two thirds of the academic year nearly over, I would like to thank you once again for your continued support for the students in our schools. This is particularly an important time of the year for Year 11 and Year 13 who are preparing to complete national examinations starting in May.

I am delighted to inform you that another school will be joining the trust. Wellfield School in East Durham is expected to join us from 1st June, it is a good community school with similar values to our other two academies. This is the first school to join us since the trust's formation in 2011 and we hope more local schools will join us in the future.

Although the academic year is not yet over, I like to reflect on progress made in some areas across the trust since September, some examples I would like to include are:

SKI YOU LATER

On Saturday 4th March NCDAT held its inaugural ski trip to the Pila ski resort in the Italian Alps. 102 students and 14 staff from Consett Academy, North Durham Academy and Wellfield School set off on 3 coaches to our destination hotel in Aosta. After a long 24 hour journey, including a ferry crossing from Dover to Calais we arrived tired but excited in Aosta. Students and staff were fitted with ski boots and skis and then we settled into our hotel for the evening ready to start the new adventure the next day.

An early breakfast was the order of each day before setting off to collect skis and boots, a short walk to the gondola next for the 17 minute ride from the town to the resort, climbing to 1800 metres and allowing for some incredible views of the town and Alps.

Students were split into ability groups and met with their instructor for the week. As with any new activity or sport most beginners found the activity very difficult for the first day or two. The vast majority showed a lot of strength and resilience to overcome this and began to ski and enjoy the experience. All students and staff made excellent progress and quickly moved from the initial baby slopes to more progressive slopes around the mountain. Nearly all students and staff were able to move from the initial blue slopes to skiing more difficult red slopes as they progressed during the week. Skiing for up to 5 hours a day is very tiring, I think that everyone looked forward to the return gondola ride back onto Aosta to return skis and boots.

A full Apres Ski activity programme had been set for the week, this included ice skating (which the students thoroughly enjoyed), a pizza night in Aosta, a town tour in Aosta, a quiz night and a presentation evening.

Before we knew it Friday evening had come round and it was time to leave to return home. I must say that after an incredibly busy, very tiring week where the days and evenings were full of activities the coach ride home was much quieter than on the outward journey.

I'm sure that every student had a wonderful learning experience on this trip, not only about learning a new skill but also about themselves. They showed a lot of determination and resilience to learn to ski, some overcame obstacles and hurdles that they never thought they could. They had the opportunity to see how other cultures live, act and interact.

Overall this was a highly successful and memorable week for all concerned.







On the 2nd March, both academies celebrated World Book Day; a day dedicated to promoting a love for reading and books!

Many staff transformed for the day – including Mr Gray (Principal of North Durham Academy)! We had Miss Trunchbull putting students firmly in their places; The Grand High Witch leading a coven of students through phonics; Jacob Marley once again appearing in his ghostly form to encourage redemption; Harry Potter switching places and becoming a professor for the day; Lady Macbeth manipulating students into picking up their reading books; and Sherlock Holmes wowing students with his impressive detective skills! At North Durham Academy, we had our Author in Residence, Dan Smith, in presenting to students in Years 7-9. Dan is the author of My Friend the Enemy, My Brother's Secret, Big Game, Boy X, Below Zero and She Wolf. Throughout this academic year, Dan has been working with students to develop their creative writing skills.

As a reading community, it is vital that we all help and support each other to become avid expert readers. In both academies, many of our students have been involved in our paired reading programme where older students support younger students with their reading. Already, this programme has been hugely successful with many of our younger readers quickly gaining confidence and looking forward to their opportunity to read to and discuss their books with their reading buddy.

Reading for pleasure is the single biggest indicator of a child's future success - more than their family circumstances, their parents' educational background or their income. With busy lives, we recognise that some of our students find it challenging to dedicate time every day to reading for pleasure - D.E.A.R. time is exactly that! D.E.A.R stands for 'Drop Everything and Read'. It happens at the start of period 5 for 10 minutes; students and teachers get their books out and enjoy 10 peaceful minutes of reading. We hope that having an extra 50 minutes of reading per week, students will really get stuck into their books and then continue to read more at home.



THERAPY DOGS

This term we have introduced Therapy Dogs to our Academies, Ben visits our students at North Durham Academy and Bella visits our students at Consett Academy.

Therapy dogs are trained to be extremely patient and good natured and they provide great companionship to students who are sufferings from anxiety or struggling with other issues in their lives.

Ben attends North Durham Academy at least one a week since the Spring term began and he puts a smile on everyone's face as he walks down the corridor with his handler.

Stroking animals, such as cats and dogs, releases endorphins, having a calming effect and therefore reducing stress levels. This is extremely beneficial for students with anxiety.

At Consett Academy, the '**Paws and Read**' scheme has been running with first graduate Lewis G (Y8).

Research suggests children can be nervous and uncomfortable when reading aloud in a classroom environment, especially those that are struggling.

The **'Paws & Read**' Programme allows these children to read to a therapy dog, as they are non-judgemental, attentive and perfect listeners.

Reading to dogs can help children to develop their reading skills and can also help children to build confidence, and self-esteem and encourage positive behaviour.

CONSETT ACADEMY SIXTH FORM

Consett Sixth Form has a reputation for academic success at Advanced level. We are also offering an expanding suite of level-3 BTEC qualifications including the chance to join our Sport Academy where you could study, train and compete while part of the Sixth Form.

We believe that education post-16 should be at forefront of teaching and learning practice but also the most important academic years in a young person's life as they take their first steps towards a career. It is a privilege to work with students at this stage in their education and it is not something we take for granted.




At both of our Academies we offer a free Breakfast Club where students enter the building at 8.00 before school starts.

ATTENDANCE

So far this year we have seen a big improvement in attendance from last year with much fewer students being below 90% (persistent absentees). All students have the target of 96% attendance and lots of our students are currently above this level. Our whole school attendance is nearly 2% higher than it was this time last year which is a big improvement!

> We celebrate good attendance at Consett Academy through our weekly White's Wheels, Attendance Leagues and rewards events such as our Inflatable event.

> We have two Educational Welfare Officer's (Mr Wheelhouse and Mrs Bone) at Consett Academy who work with students and their families to improve attendance and punctuality. They intervene with students who are late to the academy on a daily basis and make home visits and welfare checks on those with poor attendance.

LEXONIK LEAP PROGRAMME

Lexonik Leap is a fast-paced phonics-based intervention, delivered by specialist SEN TA's, aimed to fill the phonics gaps of those learners who need a little extra support in progressing their reading. The outcome is that students develop strong phonological skills allowing them to increase their sight vocabulary and improve their reading skill. The programme is delivered to groups of 4 students and is fast-paced, focused and fun, with students enjoying the challenge of the timed activities.

These are just some of our students who have completed the Lexonik Leap Programme receiving their certificates. Fantastic effort and well done to them all!!

A further well done to our golden buzzer winners Alfie and Hanna who impressed the judges


with their dedication and stage presence.

WEAR RIVER TRUST

The Wear Rivers Trust spoke to students about ways to design and install sustainable drainage (SuDS) to reduce flooding. SuDS+ is a 5 year research and development project based in the town of Stanley running until 2027. It focuses on involving local people in co-creating solutions to the flooding problems in the area.

Part of the project is to work with schools to increase young people's knowledge of flooding and sustainable drainage. In the lessons, students identified and discussed the reasons why areas flood and then took part in a challenge to create drainage systems that had a fast flow and then a slow flow. Students were fully engrossed in the activities and came up with lots of imaginative ways to significantly reduce the water flow.



Year 9 students took part in Hair, Beauty, It, Construction, Engineering, Childcare, Health and Catering classes. Lunch was prepared by NDA students for the entire college and it was delicious! Well done Year 9 we are very proud of how you have represented the Academy at Derwentside College.

PEACE ADVOCATES

To keep up to date with us throughout the year, follow us on social media. Each academy has their own social media platforms to show our staff, students and community what we're up to!










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AMY, BURNHOPE PRIMARY SCHOOL


